#### **Abstract**

This study examines the career of Major General Sir Howard Kippenberger who is often stated to have been the outstanding New Zealand civilian commander of the Second World War. It tests that assertion and asks what made him stand out amongst the other New Zealand commanders.

The heart of the study is the campaign chapters where Kippenberger 's military leadership is closely assessed. Kippenberger 's performance as a battalion commander is examined in the Greece, Crete and Crusader chapters, while his performance as a brigadier is assessed in the Minqar Qaim, Ruweisat, El Alamein, Left Hooks, Takrouna and Italian campaign chapters. Chapter 12 deals with Cassino, his only battle as a divisional commander.

Kippenberger became an outstanding military commander able to combine efficiency and professional competence with obvious concern and compassion for those serving under him. The campaign chapters demonstrate that Kippenberger possessed all the essential qualities for successful command identified by the great writers on military matters: moral and physical courage, robustness, intelligence, the determination to succeed and the ability to command loyalty and affection. Kippenberger's style of command, as is demonstrated in this thesis, was ideally suited to the ways of the New Zealand Army in which he served.

Two things set Kippenberger apart from other New Zealand commanders of the day. The first was his seminal experience as a private soldier on the Somme in 1916 during which Kippenberger experienced the crushing burdens under which the ordinary private soldier laboured and witnessed first-hand the terrible price of military incompetence. The second factor was Kippenberger 's thorough preparation for command; especially his methodical and detailed study of military history which became an all-consuming passion. That this study was undertaken as preparation for command in a war Kippenberger believed to be inevitable is indeed remarkable.

All of the above attributes and command qualities, thorough preparation and obvious concern for the welfare of those serving under him made Kippenberger an outstanding military commander. More than this it made Kippenberger that rarity in military history: a revered commanding officer.

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
